




- ➤ No incident of piracy (on high seas)
- ➤ All incidents **Armed Robbery** (internal waters, territorial seas & archipelagic waters)
- Collective efforts by law enforcement agencies to deal with incidents in their AoR & shipping industry to make <u>timely reporting</u> of incidents to coastal State & flag State



(cont'd)



- Of 59 incidents, crew not confronted in 57 incidents
- Of 2 incidents Crew assaulted in one & threatened in another incident
- Crew not injured in all incidents
- ➤ 69% (41 of 59 incidents) CAT 4 (perpetrators not armed & crew not injured)





Straits of Malacca & Singapore (SOMS)




- > Increase in incidents in Singapore Strait, decrease in Malacca Strait
- > Arrests of perpetrators in 2014 & 2015 resulted in decrease in incidents in 2016
- > If incidents continue to occur, annual number for 2022 expected to surpass that in 2021

- > 2 x CAT 2, 12 x CAT 3, 26 x CAT 4, 1 x Attempted
- ▶ 25 incidents Eastbound lane in TSS, 9 incidents Precautionary Area, 4 incidents Westbound lane, 2 incidents outside TSS, 1 in Separation Zone

Arrest of Perpetrators [19 Apr 22]


- > Tug boat towing barge in eastbound lane of TSS
- ➤ Master reported 2 perpetrators escaped from barge
- Authorities boarded barge & arrested 8 perpetrators& 1 crew member
- ➤ All 9 men charged in Singapore court

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
Singapore Strait





Stolen items (engine spares)





■ 11 (2018) \rightarrow 0 (2019) \rightarrow 5 (2020) \rightarrow 0 (2021) \rightarrow 4 (Jan-Sep 2022)

January-September 2022

- 3 x CAT 4, 1 x Attempted
- Chattogram Anchorages (3)
 - Tankers (3)
 - Cans of paint, drums of lubricating oil, gangway wire coil & ship stores stolen
 - Bangladesh Coast Guard recovered stolen items in two incidents
- Akram Point (1)
 - Six perpetrators tried to board heavy transport vessel but failed due to alertness of crew
 - Bangladesh Coast Guard apprehended perpetrators, handed them over to local police

Comments

 Commend good efforts of law enforcement agencies (recover stolen items & arrest)

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Recovery of stolen items

Incidents at Chattogram Anchorage, Bangladesh

15 Mar 22: 6 perpetrators boarded *Wawasan Topaz*, Panama-registered tanker, stole ship stores & escaped

- Within 20 min, Bangladesh Coast Guard boarded ship & investigated
- Later, duty patrol recovered stolen items

16 Apr 22: Unknown number of perpetrators boarded *BLPG Sophia*, Bangladesh-registered tanker, stole 20 cans of paint and two drums of lubricating oil, and escaped

- Bangladesh Coast Guard dispatched team to investigate
- Recovered stolen items after combing operation




(Top & Bottom) Recovery of stolen items (Source: Bangladesh authorities)

January-September 2022

- > 4 x CAT 3, 5 x CAT 4
- > Belawan Port & Anchorage (3)
 - Bulk carrier (2), Tanker (1)
 - Fire nozzles, hydrant caps & couplings, ship stores, connection cable, cover cap (fire hydrant, air pipe)
- > Jakarta Anchorages (3)
 - Bulk carrier (2), Container ship (1) / Nothing stolen
- Balikpapan Anchorage (1)
 - Tanker (1)
 - Mooring & stopper ropes
- Karimata Strait (1)
 - Bulk carrier (1) / Nothing stolen
- Panjang Anchorage (1)
 - Bulk carrier (1)
 - Auxiliary engine spares

January-September 2022

- > 4 x CAT 4
- Batangas Anchorages (3)
 - RORO car carrier (2), Tanker (1)
 - Fire hydrant cap, fire hydrant spanner, fire hose nozzle, rope bundle, grease cans and butterfly nuts stolen
- Port of Makar, General Santos (1)
 - Container ship (1)
 - Nothing stolen

Abduction of Crew in Sulu-Celebes Seas

- No incident reported since January 2020
- No crew currently held in captivity
- Presence of remnants of Abu Sayyaf Group in Sulu & off Tawi-Tawi, threat of abduction of crew remains
- Philippine Coast Guard recommends downgrading threat from 'POTENTIALLY HIGH' to 'MODERATE' [Incidents possible to occur but relatively less severe in nature]
- ReCAAP ISC updated Advisory to ships to consider re-route from area as option
 - Ships transiting area masters strongly encouraged to <u>exercise vigilance & report</u>
 immediately to Ops Centre of Philippines & Malaysia




- ➤ Collective efforts & shared responsibility of all stakeholders crucial to mitigate Piracy & Armed Robbery against Ships

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Incident reporting, response, incident verification & information sharing

(Based on IMO/MSC Circular 1333 & 1334)




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<u>Timely reporting of incident to coastal State & flag State</u>

- "Guidance to shipowner & ship operator, ship master & crew on preventing & suppressing acts of piracy & armed robbery against ships", issued by IMO Circular MSC.1/Circ. 1334 requires ship master to report all actual or attempted attacks or threats thereof, to:
 - <u>Nearest RCC</u> or <u>regional piracy focal point</u> where applicable (e.g. ReCAAP Focal Point in Asian region)
 - Flag State



- Shipping company to re-assess Risk, Ship Security Plan, Vessel Hardening Plan for safe voyage
- **Engage ship agent** at Port of call to coordinate with master for security measures
- Periodical training of crew to handle developing situation as sea

ReCAAP ISC

- ➤ Enhance regional cooperation with authorities in the region through information sharing & capacity building
- > Impress Focal Points to increase surveillance & patrols to deter perpetrators
- ➤ Emphasise importance of arrest & prosecution of perpetrators to mitigate threat from Maritime Crimes
- ➤ Continue to produce timely & accurate reports, Incident Alerts & Warnings to shipping community
- ➤ Updated & published *Regional Guide 2 to counter piracy and armed robbery against ships in Asia*
- ➤ Published Poster with contact details of MRCC & Focal Points for incident reporting
- LATEST: Published Guide Book on Identification of Fishing Boats in Asian Waters

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




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
