

#### A. MAIN TASK

To conduct maritime security and safety patrols in Indonesian waters and Indonesian jurisdiction

#### **B. FUNCTIONS**

- Formulating National Policy for maritime security and safety
- Organizing Early Warning System for maritime security and safety
- Maintaining, monitoring, preventing, and takes-action against violations of law in Indonesian waters and Indonesian jurisdiction
- Synergizing and monitoring the implementation of maritime patrol that conducted by relevant agencies
- Support technical and operational assistance to relevant agencies
- Provide search and rescue assistance in Indonesian waters and Indonesian jurisdiction
- Perform other duties relating to National Defense System




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



14 BAKAMLA'S STATIONS, 2 GROUND STATION AND COMMAND CENTER






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#### **BAKAMLA'S SURVEILLANCE ASSETS**

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#### II. PIRACY VS ARMED ROBBERY AGAINST SHIP

#### Definition of piracy:

Article 101 (UNCLOS 1982) on Piracy

- illegal acts of violence or detention
- for private ends
- by crew or pax of private ships / aircraft
- > on high seas or outside jurisdiction of any state
- directed against another ship or aircraft

#### **Armed Robbery Against Ships**

IMO Resolution A. 1025 (26) "Code of Practice for the Investigation of Crimes of Piracy and Armed Robbery against Ship"

- > illegal act of violence, detention, or depredation, or any threat, incitement, or facilitation of same
- for private ends
- directed against another ship or persons or property on board
- > within a state's internal or archipelagic waters, or territorial sea

This is not a legal definition



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#### III. INDONESIAN REGULATION ON PIRACY AND ARMED ROBBERY

#### Indonesian Penal Code (Chapter XXIX on Navigation Crime)

- Criminalize piracy on the High Seas, Coastal Area, River.
- Based on Dutch Law regarding Maritime Territory of Indonesia (TZMKO 1939).
- After UNCLOS 1982, except for the provision on the High Sea, the others are no longer applicable.


For Armed Robbery, Chapter XXII of the Penal Code will be enforce.

**CRIME RELATED DATA JANUARY - OKTOBER 2018 PERIOD** 






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#### IV. 2018 Maritime Crimes Data and 2019 Prediction

**2019 CLUSTER PREDICTION OF THREATS** 





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
#### V. INDONESIA'S EFFORT TO SUPPRESS ARMED ROBBERY AGAINST SHIPS


- > Robust operation and cooperation in the prone area (SOMS, trilateral junction, etc). For bakamla, we held combine operation with all of Indonesia's maritime security agencies for the whole year;
- Established corpat with neighboring countries (MSP, trilateral agreement, bilateral corpat eg: Malindo, Philindo, Shearwater/Gannet, Indindo, etc);
- Navy established the western fleet quick responds team (WFQR);
- Capacity building to enhance the human capacity to combat transnational crimes (Bakamla with Korea Coast Guard, ABF, USCG. Future cooperation with JCG, Indian Coast Guard, MMEA, Hellenic Coast Guard, UK, and several other countries);
- Info sharing cooperation either bilateral (MMEA, ABF, VCG, PCG, ICG), regional (HACGAM), and multilateral (interpol, UNODC). Bakamla also cooperate with all national agencies that the interest and authorities in Law Enforcement;
- > Empowered and educate coastal community on maritime security;
- > Revision of Penal Code to further criminalize Armed Robbery Against Ship;
- Establishing Bakamla's Fusion Center;
- Cooperate in verification of an incidents report.

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


