

## I. Situation update (2020)

### 1. Number of Incidents



- ☐ 97 incidents (95 actual and 2 attempted) in 2020
- ☐ 17% (14 incidents) increase in total incidents and 32% (23 incidents) increase in actual incidents compared to 2019
- $lue{}$  Highest number of actual incidents among past 5 years (2016 –



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
# I. Situation update (2020)

### 2. Severity of Incidents





- > 1 x CAT 1, 6 x CAT 2, 18 x CAT 3 and 70 x CAT 4 [lowest number of CAT 1 and CAT 2 incidents since 2007]
- > CAT 1: One actual incident of abduction of crew
- > CAT 2: Same number as 2019
- Majority (74%) are CAT 4 incidents (perpetrators not armed, crew not harmed)

## 4. Location of Incidents (2020 vs 2019)



#### Mostly at ports/anchorages

- > Bangladesh [5 incidents in 2020 vs 0 incident in 2019]
- ➤ India [9 incidents in 2020 vs 5 incidents in 2019]
- > Philippines [13 incidents in 2020 vs 7 incidents in 2019]
- ➤ Vietnam [6 incidents in 2020 vs 2 incidents in 2019]

#### Mostly while underway

- > South China Sea [4 incidents in 2020 vs 1 incident in 2019]
- ➤ Singapore Strait [34 incidents in 2020 vs 31 incidents in 2019]

### ☐ Improvement

#### Mostly at ports/anchorages

- > China [0 incident in 2020 vs 3 incidents in 2019]
- Malaysia [3 incidents in 2020 vs 8 incidents in 2019]

#### Abduction of crew

➤ Sulu-Celebes Seas [1 incident in 2020 vs 2 incidents in 2019]

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# II. Update by location

2.(4) Singapore Strait: Recommendations



■ **ReCAAP ISC issued five Incident Alerts**, with recommendations:

- > To littoral States
  - Increase surveillance and patrols of littoral States
  - Enhance information sharing and strengthen coordination among littoral States
  - Authorities to respond promptly to incident reported by ship in order to make arrest and prosecute the perpetrators
  - > To shipping industry
    - Crew to exercise utmost vigilance, adopt preventive measures and report incidents immediately to nearest coastal State



# Arrest of perpetrators at Chittagong Anchorage on 6 Mar


- Barge (Antara Koh 18) towed by tug boat (Capitol T2001) was anchored at Chittagong Anchorage when a group of perpetrators boarded the barge
- The crew of tug boat contacted a passing Bangladesh Coast Guard (BCG) ship via VHF
- The BCG boarded the barge and arrested the perpetrators

### **Arrests of perpetrators**

- Arrest of perpetrators involved in three incidents that occurred at Alang and off Gujarat
- No incident reported in these locations since the arrests



#### 2020

- ❖ 2 x CAT 2, 3 x CAT 3, 8 x CAT 4
- 9 in Manila, 3 in Batangas, 1 in General Santos
- ❖ Increase at Manila anchorage (3 → 9)
- ❖ Improvement at Batangas anchorage (4 → 3)

#### **Efforts by Philippine authorities**

- The Philippine Coast Guard has intensified patrols and law enforcement at the ports/anchorages in Manila and Batangas
- Arrest of perpetrators involved in an incident at Manila Bay in Oct 2020



#### Recommendations

- Ships to exercise vigilance and report all incidents to the relevant authorities immediately
- Law enforcement agencies to step up surveillance, especially at Vung Tau and Campha

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## III. Abduction of Crew in Sulu-Celebes Seas

### 2. Latest incident on 17 Jan 20

- 17 Jan 20: Six gunmen with masks in a grey speedboat with twin engine (40 HP) <u>abducted</u> <u>eight crew</u> from a Malaysia-registered fishing trawler
- 17 Jan 20 at about 1500 hrs: Fishing trawler was found abandoned with no crew on board off Pulau Tambisan, Lahad Datu, Sabah (Malaysia)
- 18 Jan 20: Malaysian authorities recovered three of the eight missing crew near Lahad Datu, Sabah
- ❖ 29 Sep 20: The body of one of the five abducted crew was found during a military operation in Patikul, Sulu (Philippines). The remaining four crew are still held in captivity

### 3. Warnings

ReCAAP ISC issued <u>two Warnings</u> on planned attacks based on information from the Philippine Coast Guard

#### ☐ 22 May


<u>ASG's plan of kidnapping activities</u> targeting crew of fishing boats and other slow moving ships within the waters <u>off Sabah (Malaysia)</u>

#### 2 July

On 21 Jun, <u>five ASG members were sighted</u> in Tawi-Tawi (Philippines) on board a speedboat. <u>ASG planned kidnapping in Sabah and Semporna, Malaysia targeting foreigners and crew from ships passing by the Tawi-Tawi and Sabah waters</u>



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

### 5. Guidance

☐ Shipping industry is advised to refer to the *Guidance on Abduction of Crew in the Sulu-Celebes Seas and Waters off Eastern Sabah* when transiting the area



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### **IV. Case Studies**

### 1. Off Gujarat, India

- 19 Feb 20 at about 0720 hrs: Tanker (Morbius) towed by tug boat (Allianz Titanium) was underway off Gujarat when two perpetrators boarded the tanker
  - ☐ Another seven perpetrators waited in a fishing boat
- Master of tug boat <u>raised the alarm</u> and <u>reported</u> incident to Indian Coast Guard (ICG) and local Marine Police
- <u>ICG deployed a ship</u> to the location and <u>arrested</u> all the nine perpetrators
- Perpetrators and fishing boat handed over to Marine Police Station Pipavav



- Timely reporting of incident to coastal State
- Prompt response by the law enforcement agency
- Cooperation between agencies

## **IV. Case Studies**

### 2. Singapore Strait

16 Mar 20 at about 0511 hrs: Bulk carrier (Sam Jaguar) was underway off Pulau Karimum Kecil, Indonesia in the Singapore Strait

Master reported to Batam and Singapore Vessel Traffic Information System (VTIS) of unauthorised boarding of 3 perpetrators

 Crew sighted perpetrators in engine room workshop and managed to detain them

- 16 Mar 20 at about 1303 hrs: Indonesian Navy boarded the bulk carrier
  - Arrested the three perpetrators for investigation and prosecution
- Nothing was stolen and crew was not injured

Lessons learned

- Timely reporting of incident to coastal State
- Crew should not engage in physical confrontation with perpetrators
- Prompt response by law enforcement agency


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# **IV. Case Studies**

### 3. Manila Bay, Philippines

30 Oct 20: PCG patrol boat was conducting patrol within the vicinity waters of Manila Bay when they <u>arrested 14 perpetrators</u> who stole cargoes from two barges towed by tug boat, Mika

PCG arrested the perpetrators and towed their motor bancas with the stolen cargo to Coast Guard Station Manila to file criminal charges



#### **Lessons learned**

- Intensified patrol and law enforcement by PCG
- Arrest and prosecution of the perpetrators

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
