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ReCAAP ISC Weekly Report 18-24 May 2021

Piracy and Armed Robbery Against Ships in Asia

OVERVIEW


During 18-24 May 21, two incidents of armed robbery against ships in Asia were reported to the ReCAAP ISC. One was a CAT 3¹ incident and the other was a CAT 4². Both incidents occurred to ships while underway off Tanjung Pergam, Bintan Island, Indonesia in the Singapore Strait (SS) on 23 May and 24 May within an interval of three hours. In both incidents, the perpetrators were sighted in the vicinity of the engine room of the ships. In one of the incidents, the perpetrator threatened a duty oiler with a knife but did not harm him. The perpetrators eventually escaped upon being sighted. The crew were safe and nothing was reported stolen in both incidents.

With these two incidents, a total of 15 incidents had occurred in the SS since January 2021. Of these 15 incidents, 11 incidents occurred off Tanjung Pergam, Bintan Island, Indonesia. The ReCAAP ISC is concerned with the continued occurrence of incidents in the SS and had issued an Incident Alert (IA 03/2021) on 23 Apr 21. The ReCAAP ISC advises all ships to exercise enhanced vigilance and adopt extra precautionary measures when transiting the area.

The location of the incidents in the SS since January 2021 is shown in the map (next page) and detailed description of the two incidents occurred on 23 May and 24 May are tabulated in the attachment.

¹ CAT (Category) 3 incident is 'less significant' in nature. Under this category, the perpetrators could be armed with knives/machetes or other items such as sticks or rods. The crew was not harmed although there is a small possibility that the crew could be subjected to duress or threat during the incident but not harmed physically. In most CAT 3 cases, the perpetrators were unable to steal anything from the vessel, but in cases where losses were reported, stores and engine spares were commonly targeted items.

² CAT (Category) 4 incident is classified as "least significant" in nature. Under this category, the perpetrators were not armed, and the crew not harmed.




Location of incidents

SITUATION OF ABDUCTION OF CREW IN THE SULU-CELEBES SEAS AND WATERS OFF EASTERN SABAH

There is no incident of abduction of crew reported since the last incident in January 2020 up to today, and no crew is currently being held in captivity by the Abu Sayyaf Group (ASG).

However, on 3 Nov 20, the Philippines authorities had prevented a kidnap-for-ransom plan by the ASG. On 23 Apr 21, the Philippine Armed Forces had conducted the military operation against members of the ASG during which one of the ASG leaders responsible for the abduction of crew in the area of Sulu and Tawi-Tawi had managed to escape. Therefore, the threat of the abduction of crew in the Sulu-Celebes Seas and waters off Eastern Sabah remains high.

The ReCAAP ISC reiterates its advisory issued via ReCAAP ISC Incident Alert dated 21 Nov 16 to all ships to reroute from the area, where possible. Otherwise, ship masters and crew are strongly urged to exercise extra vigilance while transiting the area, and report all incidents immediately to the Operation Centres of the Philippines and Eastern Sabah Security Command (ESSCOM) of Malaysia. RECOMMENDATION

The ReCAAP ISC urges ship master and crew to report all incidents of piracy and armed robbery against ships to the nearest coastal State and flag State, exercise vigilance and adopt relevant preventive measures taking reference from the *Regional Guide to Counter Piracy and Armed Robbery Against Ships in Asia.*
